

Case Study: Air Canada Flight 143 - "Gimli Glider"

Background: Air Canada Flight 143, also known as the "Gimli Glider," faced a unique and challenging in-flight emergency in 1983. The aircraft, a Boeing 767, experienced a dual engine failure at an altitude of 41,000 feet due to a fuel miscalculation. - The cabin crew played a vital role in preparing passengers for an emergency landing, demonstrating effective coordination and cooperation in managing the situation.
- The successful evacuation of all passengers and crew without any fatalities highlighted the importance of teamwork.

4. Training and Simulation:

- The crew's successful handling of the emergency was attributed, in part, to their training and familiarity with the aircraft systems.
- This incident underscored the importance of ongoing training and the value of realistic simulations in preparing crews for unexpected scenarios.
